

Town Boundary

Under and by virtue of the powers conferred by the Local Government Act, 1949, the Lieutenant Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Order.

O R D E R

1. The towns or settlements situated within the boundaries defined in paragraph 2 of this Order are declared to be a Municipality by the name of The Town of Deer Lake.

2. The boundaries of the town are as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the eastern side of the southern abutment of the bridge spanning the Humber River at Nichollsville with the southern bank or shore of Upper Humber River; thence easterly and following the said southern bank or shore of Upper Humber River to its junction with the western bank or shore of Junction Brook; thence following the said western bank or shore of Junction Brook to the western side of Main Dam; thence following the northern bank of the canal to the Forebay; thence following the eastern bank of the spillway to the southern bank or shore of Deer Lake; thence following along the said eastern bank or shore of Deer Lake and the aforesaid southern bank or shore of Upper Humber River to the point of beginning but excluding therefrom the Hydro-Electric plant belonging to Bowater's Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Company Limited

and rights of way on which the canal and the Buchans
Transmission line are located.

3. The Council which is to have the control and
management of The Town of Deer Lake under Section 4 of the Act
shall consist of seven persons.

4. This Order shall come into effect on the 29th
day of *May* 1950, and may be cited as "The Town of
Deer Lake (No. 1) Order, 1950."
